Infection: Don't Pass It On is a VA public health campaign established through a collaboration between the National Center for Patient Safety, Employee Education System, Infectious Diseases Program Office, National Center for Health Promotion and Disease Prevention (NCP), Public Health Services, and VA experts in infection control. The goal of the campaign is to involve staff, patients, and visitors in taking basic steps to prevent infection, whether occurring daily, seasonally, or during infectious disease emergencies (natural or man-made).
